Regarding his QRS Party week activity held earlier.

The QRS Party

From 24 th to 28 th April I worked 25 stations in the EUCW/FISTS QRS Party. With such a low number over five days, I hesitated before deciding that I ought to send in a log to support the event. Much to my amazement, I came third in Class B (QRP). I also received a shared Certificate of Merit for the "Most Readable Morse".

My “success” was really due to all the FISTS members who didn’t take part in this annual event, which was run by FISTS on behalf of the European CW Association (EUCW). Due to the various problems arising from Geo’s illness there was little publicity in Key Note for this year’s Party so I would like to remind members what it’s all about, and suggest they might have a go next year. Hopefully, it will be possible to publish the rules and remind you all in good time before the 2007 event!

The EUCW is an association of CW clubs, which holds a number of CW events every year, with each event organised and run by a different club. FISTS contribution is the annual QRS Party and this runs over five weekdays, Monday to Friday, to avoid contest activity at the weekend. As a FISTS sponsored event, it would be very nice if there could be a really big turnout by members supporting it.

It is **NOT** a contest! The rules have been simplified so that all you need to do is call CQ QRS, or answer a similar call, and have a normal QSO. If a non-QRS station, or a non-EUCW station calls you, you still have a QSO and ask him or her to QRS. The purpose is to encourage as many EUCW stations on the air as possible for one week, at speeds that everyone can enjoy, but non-EUCW stations are welcome too.

Logs are requested to give an idea of how many stations and clubs have taken part. Although it is not a contest, certificates are awarded to those working the most number of stations. There is no complicated scoring system, just a simple count of stations worked. Additionally, those sending in logs can vote for the stations with the most readable Morse to be awarded a Certificate of Merit.

Overall, it is a fun event, just plenty of enjoyable Morse (especially if we get lots of FISTS members taking part!). The motto of EUCW is “Support Morse – Support EUCW!” For one week in April each year, I suggest that FISTS motto be “Support QRS – Support the EUCW QRS Party!”
